Director's Corner

After three months, the library has finally reopened its doors to the public. Myself and the staff are probably as relieved as patrons are to be able to come back in and browse through materials and use our computers. We're sick of riding this open again/close again rollercoaster and the library is too quiet with just the staff in here.

The biggest reason we wanted to reopen the building was to provide computer access so individuals can register for the COVID-19 vaccine and obtain forms to file their taxes. We have the 1040 and 1040-SR forms (in English and Spanish) and instruction booklets, as well as Schedule A and B forms on hand and can assist with printing out any items one might need from the IRS website.

The library continues to follow the standards put in place by the state regarding pandemic-safe protocols for handling materials and mitigating the risk of virus transmission. Patrons will be required to continue wearing masks (regardless of whether they have been vaccinated) while in the building. Some may be limited and services will programming remain virtual through at least the summer. Curbside pick-up of materials and takeaway crafts will continue to be distributed in the lobby.

Library service has always been about more than the materials we loan or the answers we are able to provide. It's about coming together to create relationships and share ideas with other community members. I'm excited about this movement toward a more recognizable library experience for the town and I hope we can get all the way back to normal soon.



Join facilitators from Alliance for Collaborative Equity (ACE) to take the first steps in understanding how our society continues to consciously and unconsciously reward and punish citizens based on the color of their skin. Foundations of Equity Literacy is a workshop that covers the basics of equity, racial equity lens, bias and more in 90 minutes.

ACE is a non-profit organization dedicated to partnering with rural communities, schools, and businesses to advance equity education. As experts in adult learning facilitation, they ensure that their workshops appeal to the unique learning and processing styles of different adults. Their goal is for each participant to have an interactive and selfreflective experience for continuous learning and ongoing engagement.
