The first floor of the library is now open to the public. This includes two first-come first-serve study rooms, but the community room and conference room are not available for use.

lifted Governor Lamont building capacity restrictions for public libraries starting on March 19th. That's good news, but it will not have much of an impact on the Douglas Library. While we are technically allowed to have larger crowds in the building, those people are still need to maintain proper social distancing. Our space is large enough that we rarely reach 25 percent capacity at one time, so having permission to go to 100 percent does not make a difference. We will continue to operate as we have since reopening in February: by exercising as much caution as we can while making most services available. In person programs will not resume for a while longer, but that is becoming increasingly possible within the next few months. Keep reading SHUSH! to stay in the loop!

Museum passes

As COVID restrictions melt away with the last (fingers crossed!) piles of winter snow, it is a great time to visit Connecticut's museums and other attractions. Thanks to a generous donation by the Friends of the Library, the Douglas Library is able to offer free and reduced admission to 22 area cultural centers. There are passes in the collection for all sorts of ages and interests. Here are a few examples: buy one admission and get one free at the Mark Twain House and Museum, free admission to the Wadsworth Atheneum, take halfoff up to six admissions at the Lutz Children's Museum, save \$4 off each ticket to Mystic Aquarium. All you need to take advantage of these savings is your library card. Most passes can be accessed completely from home - there is nothing to return to the library and no late fees. Passes can be reserved up to a month in advance. The full list and instructions for use is at douglaslibrary.org (navigate to 'Museum Passes' under the 'Services' menu). As always, let us know what you like and what you wish we offered as part of the program; we are always looking for ways to improve.


Lotus Flower Lantern Craft Program


CHILDREN'S LIBRARY
