Strategic Plan Survey



Hebron Greater Together Community Grant

The Douglas Library was awarded a grant for \$1000 from the Hebron Greater Together Community Fund in August. The funds will be used to bring back the Alliance for Collaborative Equity to the library for three sessions focusing on diversity, equity, and inclusion over the next year. There will also be a book club component to the program that will allow participants to discuss some of the material presented by ACE using stories as a springboard. 

Medicare: Updates, Benefits, & Changes



On Tuesday, September 21st at 6:00pm in our Community Room, we're offering an educational event to review Medicare and how it can impact you as well as inform you if you're getting all the benefits you qualify for. We'll be discussing the difference between Original Medicare. Medicare Supplements, Medicare Advantage and Prescription drug plans. The state assistance qualifications for the Medicare Saving Program will be covered and who fits into which tier. We'll also review how the Part D coverage gap or doughnut hole works and how the Insulin Saving program can impact your annual drug cost. Please register on douglaslibrary.org or at the main desk. This event is being facilitated by Mark Macrina - Licensed Medicare and Life insurance agent with Senior Health and Retirement Services.

Storytime is back!

Beginning at the end of September, in-person Storytime will resume at the Douglas Library. The program will be held on a smaller scale than it has been in the past.

In order to adhere to social distancing guidelines, the event will be held in our lower level Community Room. Pre-registration will be required as class size is reduced to 10 children with their caregiver at each class. Registration can be done online at douglaslibrary.org.
